

AGED 102, DIES

The Eastern Townships yester-day lost one of its oldest residents, in the person of Mr. Moses Corey, who passed away at his home near Stanbridge East at the ho-norable age of one hundred and one years. Mr. Corey spent his whole life

in the neighborhood of Stan-bridge East, and celebrated his 101st birthday on September 17th. He and his brother, Benjamin, who predeceased him thirty years ago, and who, like himself, was unmarried, lived together in what was known as the Stone House near the town, and won the resp-ect of the whole community by their integrity, and for a number of years the patriarchal figure of Moses Corey had been one of the most highly regarded in the county, where until the age of ninetyfive he was actively engaged in managing his own farm.

the fans turned out in quite a large number.


