Means to Provide For Indigents Next Winter

Proposed Tax of Few Cents Per Hundred Dollars Property Valuation to Support St. Vincent de Paul Society—Question to Come Up Tonight.

Fascists Plan to Break Pact of Versailles

Adolf Hitler, Fascist Generalissimo, Declared that as Soon as Party Has Captured Political Power They Will Tear Treaty Asunder.

Leipzig. — Adolf Hitler, Fascist Generalissimo, today declared that just as soon as the German Fascists, by legal means, have captured political power in Germany, they will tear asunder the Treaty of Versailles, if necessary by means looked upon by the world as illegal. His sensational announcement of purpose was made at the trial of three Reichswehr officers to which he had been summoned as a witness. "The National Socialists do not regard the International agreements as law but as something forced upon us", he said. "Germany is gagged by the peace treaties. We do not acknowledge our guilt in the war, especially not the guilt of future generations. When we shall oppose these treaties by every possible means, we shall find ourselves in the midst of revolution." "We shall oppose these treaties both diplomatically and by completely evading them", he continued, "that may be looked upon by the world as an illegal method, but we will not employ it until the party will be more victorious. After two or three more elections our party will be in the majority." "The national Socialist movement will pursue its aims within the state with means prescribed by the constitution. The constitution, however, prescribed only the method and not the final end. We will make our party the decisive factor by means of the lawmaking bodies but, at the moment that our party has the power, we will mould the state in the form that we consider the right one."

Formal Charge of Murder Taken Out Against Former Employee of Murdered Man, Following Conclusion of Inquest at Flodden Farm on Saturday Afternoon — Large Crowd of Curious Spectators Present to Hear Evidence at Inquest.

Richmond. — Albert Vincent, twenty-eight years old, of Roxtons Falls, Que., was charged with the murder of Edouard Trudeau, wealthy Flodden farmer, by a coroner's jury at the inquest held late Saturday afternoon at the home of the deceased, where he was brutally murdered last Sunday morning, September 21st.

A large crowd, some friends of the deceased and others drawn to the scene of the crime through mere curiosity, gathered at the Trudeau farm for the inquest, which was conducted by Coroner L. Bachand, of Sherbrooke. The jury comprised Messrs. O. Pratte (foreman), N. Robichon, F. Gaulin, D. Lamarche, J. Mongeau and A. Gaucher. The inquest was somewhat delayed due to the late arrival of Dr. R. Fontaine, medical criminal investigator, of Montreal, who made the autopsy on the body. Albert Vincent, was brought from Montreal to the scene of the crime in the custody of the Provincial police. Following the finding of Edmond Trudeau's body on Wednesday afternoon, wrapped in blankets and buried under a cord of carefully arranged wood, Vincent was stopped in Jalbert's restaurant at Roxton Falls by Assistant Chief Dorais and Detective Jargaille, of the Provincial police, for questioning, as he was known to have been a former employee of the deceased. Vincent's alibi was found unsound, and soon after the police claim he confessed that he had committed the crime. The post-mortem examination conducted by Dr. Fontaine revealed that Trudeau had been killed at least six hours after having eaten, evidently early Sunday morning. Death was due to a crushed skull, battered by some sharp and blunt instrument, and to a terrible gash at the neck, which had completely severed the carotid and jugular arteries. A bruise was found on the left leg and a deep cut on the left arm inflicted by some sharp instrument.

Will This Long Awaited Project Materialize?

The Town Council Ready to Start Erection of Building for City Hall — Pecuniary Aid Will be Requested From Federal Government When Delegation Goes Ottawa.

The long dreamed of City Hall for Drummondville may materialize shortly according to reports received recently. As a matter of facts, our municipal authorities are ready to start the erection of this building this fall, should the Governments accord substantial pecuniary aid.

The delegation which will soon go to Ottawa to ask our part of the \$20,000,000 budget in order to bring about alterations to our draining system will take advantage of their passage in the Capital to make a special request for a subsidy of \$50,000 for the immediate construction of a City Hall in Drummondville.

Should the Federal Government grant this amount, another similar request will immediately be made to the Provincial Government, who without doubt will acquiesce to the demand. The tax-payers and the County Council will then have to be consulted in order to know whether they would be ready to do their part, what would approximately be \$50,000.

NEW KIND OF COAL FOUND IN PORT ARTHUR

Port Arthur, Ont. — Workmen of the city engineer's department are using a new kind of coal these days, coal that they found while digging for a sewer connection near Hall street. Chips from the seam of black rock formation they discovered eleven feet below the road's surface, burns, workmen claim. Frank Graham, assistant city engineer, tried it out in the furnace of a downtown building and found the same thing. The seam is about six inches wide. It is felt that the seam, if followed, may reveal a rich deposit.

Two Young Men Were Killed At Scotstown

Pierre Cote and Fred St. Laurent, Both Seventeen Years of Age, Instantly Killed When Saws Machine They Were Operating Broke.

Scotstown. — Two seventeen-year-old Scotstown youths, Pierre Cote and Fred St. Laurent, were instantly killed last week when the sawing machine which they were operating broke in some undetermined manner. The two victims, with several other companions, were sawing wood on the property of Cote's father when the catastrophe occurred about nine-thirty o'clock at night. Pieces of the saw were scattered in all directions, two of the splinters hitting Cote and St. Laurent on the head and causing instant death. A third victim, Hector Tetreault, eighteen years old, also of Scotstown, had four teeth knocked out and suffered injuries to the side of the head, but is not in a serious condition.

The bodies were removed to the Cote home, which is situated on Ditton street, and inquest was held in the afternoon by Coroner L. Bachand, of Sherbrooke. Dr. C. M. Smith, local physician, was summoned to the scene of the accident, but his services were only required for Tetreault, the other two lads being beyond medical aid.

Great Britain To Reorganize Its Railways

Stated that Partial State Ownership and Private Management Is Being Seriously Considered by Government.

London. — The Daily Express says that reorganization of British railways under partial state ownership and private management is being seriously considered. The Government would purchase a controlling interest in the different lines, according to the plan under study, and a "railway dictator" would be placed in charge. The Express connects the scheme with the recent visit to Canada of Sir Herbert Walker, manager of the Southern Railway, and Sir Ralph Wedgwood, manager of the London and Northeastern. It says that these managers conferred with Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National group, about an arrangement similar to that under which Canadian railroads have developed.

Sewer from A Street to St. John to the Drummondville Cotton, \$2,000;

The tax-payers will then be asked their approbation in the least possible delay in order to proceed immediately.

Over Five Million Spent On Highway Construction

Quebec. — In addition to his duties as head of the Department of Highways and Mines, Hon. J. E. Perrault took over yesterday the administration of the Department of Agriculture during the absence of Hon. J. L. Perron, who has gone south to recuperate, and will be absent until the end of next month. Mr. Perrault spent a busy day conferring with his principal officials, Colonel J. L. Boulanger, Deputy Minister of Roads; Antonio Grenier, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, and A. O. Dufresne,

Director of Mines. He will leave next week for Washington, D.C., where he will attend the International Road Congress.

Referring to the programme, executed, in addition to the planned one to deal with unemployment, Hon. Mr. Perrault announced today that there were still over 25,000 men engaged on road work.

"These men will be kept busy until the end of the season, that is until the first snow," he stated. "It may be interesting to note," he added, "that from the first of July to the 20th, the Department of Roads has spent \$4,451,000. Of that amount, \$2,892,000 was taken from the ordinary budget of the department; \$994,000 out of permanent paving budget; \$889,000 out of the highway budget; \$100,000 out of the mining budget, and \$75,000 out of the circulation budget."

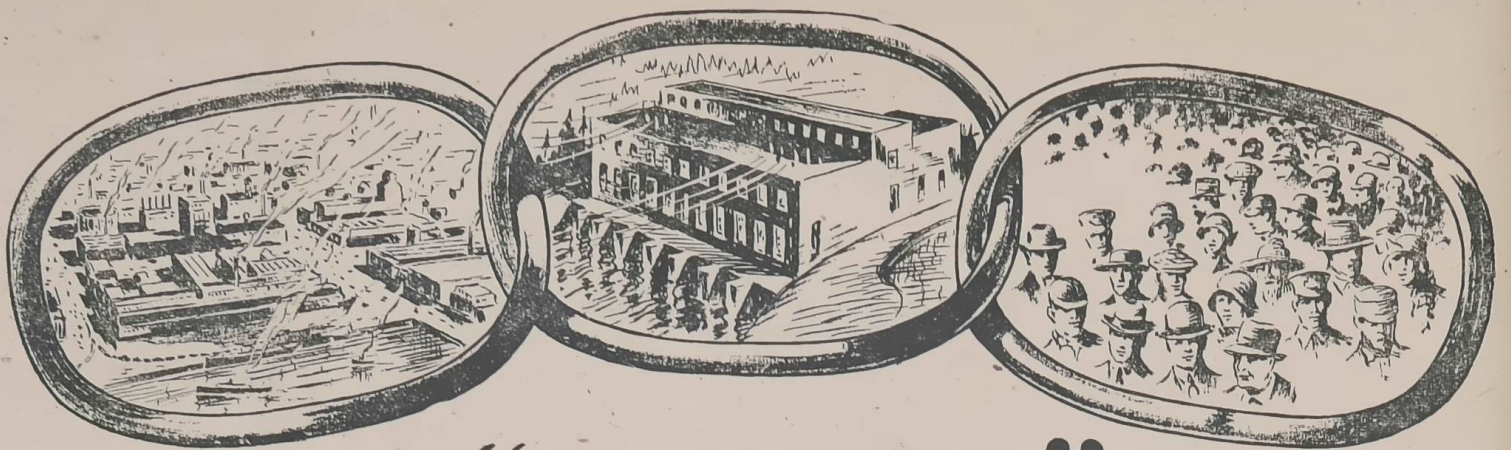
