

phosphorus, hydrogen and oxygen. These elements are combined into fairly large-sized "bricks" of crystalline form.

These bone-building bricks are not as small as the geometrically arranged atoms forming many crystals, but are bigger aggregations of matter. They are too large for analysis with ordinary X-rays and too small to be seen with light. The "soft" X-ray has just the right wave length to pass between the open spaces in the bone crystals and show the structure.

Very Rev. William Ralph Inge Believes Most of World's Problems Could Be Solved.

London. — Very Rev. William Ralph Inge, Dean of St. Paul's, said in an address last night he believed most of the world's problems could be solved by a League of Nations along the lines of the British Empire. His subject was "What I coud do with the world."

"My two hopeful and helpful examples of a League of Nations from history are both the work of Anglo-Saxons," he said. They are the American Federal Republic, inhabited by every nation under heaven, and the British Commonwealth of Nations.

"There you have two leagues of nations in being. The Americans had the easier task and they once had a civil war, but theirs is a mar-velous achievement, full of encouragement for the future. Our great experiment is still insecure, but it is by far the biggest things in the way of a League that has yet been at-







Legislature Will...

The Montreal Bill will come up before the private bills committee on Wednesday morning at 10,30, and it is hoped that the whole matter may be disposed of by the end of the week. As all the financial clauses have yet to be taken up and as there may be considerable investigation of the city's financial position, there may be some difficulty in getting the bill through committee by the end of the week.

A short session of the Assembly

was held yesterday morning when a considerable amount of business, largely routine, was dealt with. In view of the long week-end, as there will be no sessions on Tuesday because of the celebration of the Immaculate Conception, practically all the Legislators returned to their homes during the day, and, in fact from the very slim representation on both sides of the House.

The members departed after a week that had seen the first and just about the only day of real excitement during the current session. That was on Wednesday when there was a lively time in the discussions of the Montreal Bill and a vigorous debate in the Assembly on Hon. Mr. Dillon's bill, and when there was also a noteworthy debate in the Legislative Council. Thursday the Legislature settled back to the comparatively dull routine that has marked its proceedings of late.


