Permanent Pavings Are Requested From Highways Ministry

A Resolution to this Effect Was Passed on Tuesday Last by Local Chamber of Commerce, Municipal Council of St. Cyrille and St. Germain and Probably Drummondville.

At the meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce held on Tuesday evening last, the decision was reached to the effect that a resolution be addressed to the Provincial Department of Highways asking for the permanent paving of the national highway, from St. Germain to the village of St. Cyrille, passing by Drummondville, as well as the Sherbrooke-Drummondville road, from Boulevard Mercure to Bridge street. The motion was proposed by Dr. A. Rajotte and seconded by Mr. J. A. Carignan.

Dr. Rajotte said that he had done quite a lot of traveling during the last season and that everywhere he had seen considerable permanent pavings done in and around small towns. Drummondville is one of the rare places where no such work as yet been made. However, the national highways crossing Drummondville are among those where there is much traffic and there is no reason why we could not obtain a favorable answer to our request. These roads have been widened at many points, notably between St. Cyrille and Drummondville as well as between the latter place and St. Germain and their upkeep involve considerable expenses each summer. If all these highways were covered with permanent paving, these one-way expenses would be eliminated and we would have more interesting roads exempt of dust. This would mean a considerable enterprise, but during this time of depression and unemployment, it would contribute in a large measure to relieve such conditions.

All these roads are ready for permanent paving, having all been widened and the curves straightened. This work will have to be done some day, so might as well start now, this spring.

Dr. Rajotte also said that he would see that these resolutions are approved by the municipal council of St. Cyrille, St. Germain, village and country in both places. These resolutions will be addressed to the Department of Highways with that of the Chamber of Commerce as well as that of our Municipal Council.

This request is made in advance in order that the Highway Ministry may include it in its spring programme.

Subscriptions to Loan Over \$215,000,000

Acting Minister of Finance Announces that Excess Will Be Used to Redeem Outstanding Dominion Obligations.

Ottawa. — With the closing of the National Service Loan books has come the announcement from Hon. E. N. Rhodes, acting Minister of Finance, that the subscriptions to the loan reached the sum of \$215,000,000.

The Minister added: "The amount the Government asked the Canadian people to subscribe was \$150,000,000 and when it became apparent on November 26th that the full amount was in sight, the Government decided the books would be closed on November 30th. However, the volume of applications for December 1st delivery, for which the Government agreed to make provision, exceeded all expectations, with the result that in the space of one week the Canadian people subscribed both the \$150,000,000 asked for an additional sum of over \$65,000,000.

Canada Will Have Pact With Brazil

Trade Agreement Signed Provisionally Between Two Countries.

Rio de Janeiro. — A commercial agreement between Brazil and Canada was signed provisionally at the Foreign Ministry yesterday.

The signing of the agreement was provisional because it must have the approval of the Canadian Parliament before becoming effective.

Ottawa, Dec. 5 (C.P.)—No officials of the Government could be reached last night for comment on the trade agreement between Canada and Brazil which was provisionally signed in Rio de Janeiro yesterday.

Canada has for years carried on a considerable import and export trade with Brazil and in the last two years the balance has been in favor of the Dominion.

During October last, according to latest available statistics, Canada exported products to Brazil to the value of \$60,598 and imported goods from that country to the value of \$67,000. During the year ended October 31st, Canada's exports to Brazil were valued at \$1,492,079 as compared with \$3,543,845 in the previous year. Brazilian imports to Canada for the same periods were \$1,074,765 and \$1,481,820.

Details of the proposed treaty could not be had here last night.

Ontario Plans to Cut Budget Five Millions

Wide Range of Topics Covered by Hon. W. H. Price During Toronto Speech.

Toronto. — Reorganization of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board with a view to having this body regulate and govern expenditure of municipalities, together with a reduced expenditure of \$5,000,000 by the Ontario Government for 1932, were announced by Hon. W. H. Price, Attorney-General for Ontario, at a luncheon tendered him by the Liberal-Conservative Business Men's Club yesterday.

The Ontario Railway Board is to be amalgamated with the Government Municipal Board and the allied bodies vested with power to deal with municipal financial matters. J. A. Ellis, member of the Ontario Railway Board and head of the Municipal Board will direct the work. H. L. Cummings, of the Attorney-General's Department, will be attached to the Ontario Railway Board.

Col. Price stated investigations by his department into municipal finances throughout the province by Mr. Cummings and Mr. Ellis have led them to believe this step is advisable in order to have some body to which municipalities may look for advice on their financing and thus control their debt issues. Municipalities will be asked to cut their ordinary expenditures to lower their tax rates.

Government Is Requested to Take Action

Decision of Railway Commission Before Taking Action Re Transportation Companies.

Quebec. — The Quebec Government will await the report of the recently appointed Dominion Commission to study the transportation problem in Canada before taking any action in this province to regulate motor bus and motor traffic.

To a delegation from one of the biggest motor transportation companies in Quebec, which waited on Premier L. A. Taschereau with a view to having new regulations introduced in the provincial transport law, Mr. Taschereau said the Government would await the findings of the Dominion commission "so that we can have co-ordinated laws throughout the province if possible."

The following remedies to existing abuses in motor traffic were suggested: Prohibition of passenger-carrying by motor trucks licensed for merchandise; persons driving cars for hire must have taxi driver's license; appointment of special and competent officers to issue chauffeurs' licenses and more severe regulations as to driver's qualifications; periodical physical examinations of all chauffeurs; no licenses to be issued to persons of known drunken habits; more severity in cancellation of license; obligatory insurance against accidents to passengers; amendment of code of civil procedure authorizing seizure before judgment of all cars from without the province implicated in accidents where damages may be claimed.

Much Foreign Building Material Used in Canada

Industrial Commission Chairman Claims Canadian Producers Are Overlooked by Firms.

The results of a year's survey of the use of foreign building materials in Quebec buildings are incorporated in a lengthy report issued today by the Montreal Industrial Commission on Unemployment, through Norman Holland, chairman. Mr. Holland made the survey personally and in the report facts are given to support the argument that in practically every case investigated, where American products were used, the equivalent, equally as good in price and quality, could have been obtained in Canada.

Supporting this statement is a list showing what American products were used and where the Canadian equivalent could have been purchased.

HELP CANADIAN FIRMS

The attention of Professor Percy E. Nobbs, president of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada was drawn to the situation existing a few months ago. At that time it was not considered advisable to take any action but now that the facts have been substantiated the Institute is mailing a copy of the survey to every member throughout Canada. This, it is felt, may be the means of bringing more business to Canadian firms.

The lengthy document of 19 pages states that in the fiscal year ending March 31, 1931, Canada imported from the United States building materials valued at \$26,945,437 according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. In this total is included

Stronger Sea Aviation Plan Is Propounded

Rear Admiral Moffett Desires More Money, More Ships, More and Faster Aeroplanes — Says Plane Industry in "Serious Condition."

Washington, D.C. — More money, more ships, more and faster aeroplanes, is what Rear-Admiral Moffett, chief of sea aviation, wants.

He bluntly recommended these things in his annual report to Charles Adams, Secretary of the Navy. Moffett warned that the country is being held in construction of aircraft carriers, urged that the limit allowed by treaties be built as soon as possible. He asked also for night flying-deck cruisers, a new and tried weapon of war upon which he puts high hopes.

The air chief asked for a substantial increase in the thousand plane force of the navy, both to equip all ships and to aid the plane industry which he said was in "a serious condition."

Legislature Will Not Adjourn Before Christmas Week

Quebec House May Sit Until December 23 and Reconvene January 5 — Three Contentious Matters of Legislation Now Being Debated.

Quebec. — Members of the Legislative Assembly will probably be at work until one or two days before Christmas, as Premier Taschereau has denied reports that the House will adjourn for the Christmas vacation on December 18th. It will sit, he said, until December 23rd, and possibly resume on January 5th.

Some indication of how long the whole session will last this year will be gained when it is known how much will have been accomplished by the time of the Christmas adjournment. Three important matters are now before the Assembly, the budget debate, the Montreal Bill and the Hon. J. H. Dillon's bill to amend the Controverted Elections Act. If these three could be dealt with before Christmas, it then might be possible to finish the session by the end of January or early in February at the latest.

Little progress has as yet been made on the budget debate, as only four speakers have been heard. The Prime Minister and Hon. Hector Laferte, Minister of Colonization, Game and Fisheries, have spoken for the Government side; while C. E. Gault, Opposition House leader, and Aime Guertin, M.L.A. for Hull, have also been heard in this debate. There are many young Liberals who will want to make themselves heard, and it is certain that all the members of the Opposition will speak in this debate.

Prior to the resumption of the budget discussion, however, it is expected that the Election Contestation Act will be disposed of, as there only remain two of the nine clauses to be dealt with in committee. Just how long this will take will depend on the Opposition tactics in the consideration of these last two clauses.

This matter will be taken up again on Wednesday, the Prime Minister stated.

Have Devised Way to Smash Atomic Unit

Scientists Experimenting With Gamma Ray Claim that They Have Been Successful in Their Efforts.

New York. — Professor Robert Andrews Millikan, whose ability as a scientist has won him a Nobel prize, disclosed yesterday he and an associate had found a way to smash the atom, until recently considered the smallest thing in the universe.

Heretofore, he explained the attack on the atom has been made with the cosmic, or alpha, ray as the weapon. For two years, however, he and Dr. Karl D. Anderson, his collaborator at the Norman Bridge Laboratory, Pasadena, Cal., have been experimenting with the gamma ray.

He explained gamma and cosmic rays were of the same classification but of decreasing energies and added:

"Dr. Anderson has been working on the effect of these rays on the nuclei of the atom. The effect is to knock electrons and protons out of the atom, with enormous energy. Dr. Anderson seems to have obtained the actual smashing of the atom with the gamma ray."

He said so far the cosmic ray has not been isolated, but from observations its action upon atoms would have the effect of scattering the protons at half the velocity of light and the electrons at 90 per cent or almost the complete speed of light, 186,000 miles a second."

X-Ray Offers Treatment for Women's Ills

New Methods of Protecting Health of Women Demonstrated to Members of Radiological Society of North America.

St. Louis, Mo. — X-ray discoveries offering new methods of protecting the health of women were shown to the Radiological Society of North America here today.

One is the earlier detection of cancer of the breast with X-ray pictures and the other use of these pictures in a completely harmless method of discovering expected motherhood almost at its beginning.

Dr. Ira H. Lockwood, of Kansas City, exhibited some recently taken X-ray plates showing that breast cancer, one of the special afflictions of women, can be seen with the rays at an earlier stage than it can now be detected by the other method.

In this early stage the cancers are generally regarded by the medical profession as readily curable. The early ones shown by Dr. Lockwood were cured by surgery. All of them were detected with aid of X-ray films which show flesh as well as bones, combined with expert study of meanings of the shadows.

X-rays have been used for years to detect expect motherhood, but in the early stages some sort of internal coloring was needed to make the picture apparent. Dr. A. Jerome Thomas, of Shreveport, La., has discovered how to do it with no more bother than sitting for an X-ray picture.

Family Poisoned Through Eating Spoiled Can Food

Kingston, N. Y. — The three surviving members of the Prinka family, two of whom are dead from food poisoning, remained critically ill today in a hospital here. Anna, seven, and Bernice, two, died yesterday. Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Prinka, and Frederick, Jr., five, also were stricken after the family had eaten home-preserved spinach and Swiss chard Monday. The boy was reported slightly better than his parents.

Serum used in treating botulism, poisoning caused by eating spoiled food, was sent from the state laboratory at Albany for use in treating the Prinkas.

Utopia Would Result From World League

Very Rev. William Ralph Inge Believes Most of World's Problems Could Be Solved.

London. — Very Rev. William Ralph Inge, Dean of St. Paul's, said in an address last night he believed most of the world's problems could be solved by a League of Nations along the lines of the British Empire. His subject was "What I could do with the world."

"My two hopeful and helpful examples of a League of Nations from history are both the work of Anglo-Saxons," he said. They are the American Federal Republic, inhabited by every nation under heaven, and the British Commonwealth of Nations.

"There you have two leagues of nations in being. The Americans had the easier task and they once had a civil war, but theirs is a marvellous achievement, full of encouragement for the future. Our great experiment is still insecure, but it is by far the biggest things in the way of a League that has yet been attempted."

Dean Inge said that as "dictator" he should be obliged to take very drastic steps to disarm Russia as "otherwise the civilization of Europe and Asia may be destroyed by a new series of tartar invasions like those of Genghis Khan and Timur."

Face paint, scarlet lips and dyed hair would be offensive in a utopia suggested by Dean Inge.

One of the first reforms, he said, would be to nominate a committee to revise the dress of men and women.

Eskimos Have Altered Their Marriage Laws

Halifax, N.S. — The old order changed, yielding place to the new — and perhaps in no other sphere of human life has there been such a change in recent years as in marriage customs, particularly true of the Eskimos of the Canadian Arctic. Up until the last decade swapping of wives, though almost unheard of in America, was quite the common thing among the Eskimos, and the present custom seems to be swinging back.
