of Commission Permanent Paving Project Will be Submitted Tax-Payers — Main Lines Have Been Laid Down Municipal Council.

At the last meeting, of the Mu-nicipal Council, His Worship Mayor Moisan gave out the main lines that have been laid down in connection with the municipal programme of public works to be accomplished during the summer, should the taxpayers give their consent. He is made to carry a load of some \$2,500,000,000.00 of taxes in order to pay the annual interest on this \$55,000,000,000.00 of debt that performs no useful service, produces no revenue and is held by a few financial barons. It is the prime cause of the bunching of wealth and credit which must be overcome, if civiliation is to endure.

THE GROWING BUBBLE

Of course it is being overcome. In the words of Shakespeare, this "rash fierce blaze of riot cannot last, for violent fires soon burn out them-The above mentioned \$55,000,000,000.00 of a bubble is swelling to the breaking point more rapidly than is generally realized. In the current issue of the "Monthly Review" of Lloyds Bank, London, England, Sir William Dampier, D. Sc. F.R.S., points out that "debts incurred in the years just after the war and payable in gold are now three times as burdensome as they were when contracted, measured in the amount of wholesale commodities which have to be sold either to liquidate the debts or to pay interest upon them." He strenuously opposed Mr. Luchkovich's motion and has evidently decided to retain supervision of insurance notwithstanding the decision of the Privy Council, which says emphatically that the Dominion Government has no legal right under the terms of the British North American Act to such supervision. Senator Meighen, leader of the government in the Senate, has re-introduced the In-

surance Bill in the Senate. If ever a Prime Minister was given an opportunity to make good his repeated promises to curtail expenditure, Mr. Bennett was given that opportunity in the Privy Council's decision to close up and save the cost of the Insurance Department at Ottawa. He cannot claim that the provinces do not want that jurisdiction, because they have had it for years, and during the last twenty years have spent much in litigation expenses to establish their right to sole jurisdiction. It is absolutely necessary that each province maintain an insurance department; but it is not at all necessary for the Do-

minion Government to have one. Mr. Bennett's attempt to retain an insurance department at Ottawa is the gravest piece of injustice to Canadian policyholders and to Canadian taxpayers. His action can have but one purpose, viz., to give validity to the Order-in-Council his government passed on the 31st of December, 1931, by which the Sun Life and the North American Life swindlers are permitted to give a fictitious value to their worthless stocks and thus avoid being brought into the courts.
